Budget Timeline: FY 2013



Sep. 28th: Six month CR passed



March 26th: full-year CR (with sequestration)

Oct. Nov. Dec. Jan. Feb. Mar. Apr. May Jun. July – Sep.

Jan. 1st: Congress passed a two month delay to sequestration



May 15th: Reprogramming to align funding within program



Budget Timeline: FY 2014 Events and FY 2015 Outlook



Oct. 1st – 16th: Lapse in appropriations severely impacts EM operations



Dec 26th: Bipartisan Budget Act of 2013 signed into law



Oct. 17th – Jan. 18th: EM fundingat \$4.9B level (\$700M below request)



President releases FY 2015 budget request

Oct. 17tH: Congress passes Continuing Resolution, ending lapse in appropriations




Jan 17th: Full-year appropriation funds EM \$208M above request




Sep. 30th – Deadline for Congress to pass an appropriation for FY 2015



EM Long-Term Budget History




EM's Recent Budget History






EM's FY 2014 Budget: Funding by Mission Area






EM Funding by Site in FY 2014 (Dollars in Millions)






Funding by Site – Change from FY 2013 to FY 2014 (Dollars in Millions)





Impact of Funding Reductions on Purchasing Power



- between two main categories: The costs of maintaining a safe, secure and operations ready posture ("Maintenance Dollars") and the costs of performing active cleanup work ("Progress Dollars").
- Funding reductions disproportionately impact "Progress Dollars," since maintenance costs are largely fixed.
- ➢ High maintenance costs are driven in part by the 78 Hazard Category 2 and 3 Nuclear Facilities managed by EM (more than any other DOE program).
